Statistic of the Week:

Research with 2,275 young people aged 11-17 about their experiences of emotional abuse suggests around 1 in 15 children in the UK have been emotionally abused.

New Year = Safer Devices. Safety Settings—why they are important.

Ensuring the safety of children and young people used to mean showing them how to cross the street and teaching them not to talk to strangers. In the new digital age, this has expanded. Parents and carers are now required to be informed about the online world, the risks it can pose to their children, and how to protect them.

A child may seem safe in their bedroom, but the online world exposes them to countless harms. This is where safety settings come in. Safety settings can allow parents and carers to:

- Tailor the online experience to be age-appropriate, increasing protection from harmful or upsetting content.
- Control access to content without limiting the online experience for older members of the family.
- Mute, block and report users or content that is inappropriate.
- Plan what time of day children and young people can use their devices or specific platforms, and how long for
- Monitor online activity while respecting children and young people's privacy



Whatsapp Groups

Recent concerns have emerged regarding a WhatsApp group known as 'Add Everyone.' Schools and regional police forces across the UK have warned that this group exposes children and young people to explicit and harmful material.

What are 'Add Everyone' group chats?

'Add Everyone' group chats can go by many names, but their purpose is often the same. These WhatsApp groups are spaces where children and young people are invited to join a chat that contains content such as sexual images, material promoting self-harm, sexual violence, racism and other inappropriate content. These chats may be created by adults seeking to connect with younger users or by young people themselves as a seemingly fun activity. However, as the name suggests, it is difficult to control who becomes a member of these groups, which means that access to children and young people can easily fall into the wrong hands. In some cases, the group owners ask for children to add their contacts to the group, 'except their parents'.



As WhatsApp has lowered its minimum age from 16 to 13 this year, the risk of young users encountering inappropriate content and adults may increase. However, reports indicate that these groups have targeted children as young as 9.
