#### About the course:

Qualification structure:

You will study the following Units over Year 12 and Year 13

- 1. Changing Awareness of Crime Year 12 Internal controlled assessment
- 2. Criminological Theories Year 12 External exam
- 3. Crime Scene to Courtroom Year 13 Internal controlled assessment
- 4. Crime and Punishment –Year 13 External Exam

You must complete **ALL** units to pass the course.

The first unit looks at different types of crime, influences on perceptions of crime and why some crimes are unreported.

The second mandatory unit will allow you to gain an understanding of why people commit crime, drawing on what you have learned in Unit 1.

The third unit will provide you with an understanding of the criminal justice system from the moment a crime has been identified to the verdict. You will develop the understanding and skills needed to examine information in order to review the justice of verdicts in criminal cases.

In the final unit, will allow you to apply your understanding of the awareness of criminality, criminological theories and the process of bringing an accused to court in order to evaluate the effectiveness of social control to deliver criminal justice policy.

The course will allow you to develop:

- skills required for independent learning and development
- a range of generic and transferable skills
- the ability to solve problems
- the skills of project based research, development and presentation
- the fundamental ability to work alongside other professionals, in a professional environment
- the ability to apply learning in vocational contexts

#### **Academic and Career Pathways**

The course can lead to further education courses such as:

- BA Criminology and Criminal Justice
- BSc (Hons) Criminology and Psychology
- LLB (Hons) Law with Criminology
- BA (Hons) Criminology and Sociology
- BA (Hons) Criminology
